What a fascinating and unique September meeting.

KSCD 2020 KOI Show: 2020 Show Chairman reported the first contract payment for the 2020 KOI Show has been made. The Show at the Del Mar Fair Grounds has been confirmed For Marc 6th, 7th and 8th 2020. The show is moving right along.



KHA KORNER by "KOI" Jack Chapman Ammonia NH3 & Ammonium NH4

Can never go wrong with water quality articles and ammonia is one of my favorites to try and keep fresh on your mind and I've not written on it since 2017 so this is an update of that article. The most important aspect in maintaining your koi's health is proper water quality. All koi hobbyists need a rudimentary understanding of NH3 and NH4. Ammonia NH3 is toxic to koi and can and will cause additional stress, a reduction in growth, drab coloration, increased illness events with extended healing times due to depressed immune system, reduced life span via gill hyperplasia (reduces oxygen absorption and waste excretion ability of gill tissue) leading to loss of koi. Ammonia is a by-product of protein metabolism from utilization of ingested food and is excreted from the gills (reported to be 75 to 80%) or as urea for the remainder. So by feeding more during summer with higher protein foods you will have increased your koi's NH3 production – BIG TIME! Also don't forget that koi are NOT the only source of ammonia in your pond – as the decomposition of all organic material produces ammonia. Think all plant material, uneaten food and oh yes undigested/non-assimilated food ingredients expelled as fish poop. If your pond water source has chloramines, ammonia will be released when you dechlorinate the water with chemicals. So, no article trying to do justice on this subject can escape the science/chemistry to provide the reader a basic understanding of the constant moving target of the level of toxicity of ammonia given a range of pH and temp. Most articles on this subject are complete with charts and I would encourage you to review them for a better understanding of this moving target of toxic levels. Put as simple as I can:

Ammonia NH3 Ammonium NH4

Un-ionized Ionized

Toxic Mostly Non-toxic

In water the reaction can and does go both directions NH3 to NH4 & NH4 back to NH3.

Most test kits measure total ammonia and yes it's a total of un-ionized and ionized.

pH is the key player as to the toxicity level and as pH rises so does the percentage of toxic un-ionized NH3.

Temperature is a secondary factor and as water temp rises so does the toxicity level of a given pH level. This effect is not as significant as the pH changes.

Ammonia has proven to be even more toxic in the presence of low oxygen levels.

In my opinion and to cut to the chase, any test kit measurable amount of ammonia is undesirable and in need of corrective action. All the charts do is help with the degree of urgency at hand, which is why I kept the science to a minimum. Yes, 0.1ppm should make you want to reduce it!! It has been my KHA experience that the long term low level exposure to ammonia is discovered when I make a pond call for sick koi (parasites and bacteria) and find the additional problem of low to moderate levels of ammonia. Your koi suffering from the effects of ammonia poisoning can isolate themselves, stay on the bottom with clamped fins, and upon examination be very slimy. They can develop a general pink to red hue on the body with small red lines and red lines in the fins and red at the edges of fins. We call it ammonia burn. Believe it or not a pond or show tank can even produce an identifiable smell to it – learned from experience.

So what's a pond owner to do???

Foremost have an Ammonia Test Kit that's less than a year old and test your water weekly – before your weekly water change and pre-filter cleaning and record the results.

KHA KORNER by "KOI" Jack Chapman

The following list is not in order of precedents but the first few are more significant in reducing ammonia levels. And I'm sure I've missed some.

Daily water changes – The solution to pollution is dilution!!

Reduce feeding (low level 0.5ppm) to spot feeding (1.0 or higher). Koi do just fine for a couple of weeks and longer without being fed.

Reduce fish load.

Reduce your water turn over time – get the water with NH3 to the filter faster.

Increase bio capacity – part of a long-term plan.

Use chemicals (ClorAm-X or Ultimate) to bind the ammonia into a non-toxic form and best if done in connection with a large water change.

Clean pre-filter more often and keep bottom of pond clean and free of visible particulate matter.

Look into activated carbon – good for pollutants to include ammonia and good for 3 to 4 months.

Look into sludge buster and bio boosters – to each his own.

Add salt – suggest 1 pound per 100 gallons for a reading of 0.1% to increase ionization of ammonia making ammonia less toxic – per Nicholas Saint-Erne, DVM. (Caution – salt will release the ammonia from your Zeolite bag so remove the bag before adding salt).

If oxygen levels are low then add oxygen as the closer you get to oxygen saturation in your pond water the better.

Rechargeable Zeolites – old school but could help in short run till other changes catch-up but not in combination with salt. Additional shade to help lower pond temp.

On short temp bases for higher pH's with higher ammonia levels you can look into reducing the pH, but you want to avoid wide daily pH changes OR go back to number 1 on this list.

When this article was edited John Svelan asked if I wanted to mention a pH crash with an additional ammonia issue. Good catch for John as when you have a pH crash with fish loss you are so concerned about raising the pH you just forget to check your NH3 levels that will become more poisonous to your koi when you elevate your pH which could lead to additional koi losses. You would need to bind the NH3 with the chemicals listed in number 6 above before or in connection with a large water change.

That about covers it for me and hopefully gives you reason to explore more info on your own as it is not hard to find a ton of info on the subject. Just maybe you will even find time to test your pond water for ammonia.

Editors Note: Some added information that may prove helpful. Some test kits will still show ammonia, nitrite and nitrate after using a bonding agent. The binders Do Not remove the ammonia Nitrite and Nitrate but bind it so it is less harmful to your fish and your filter can digest it much easier. There is a test for FREE ammonia, not bound I think one is made by seachem.

There are other dechlors out there that also bind such as Prime and Safe. These will also bind the ammonia, nitrite and nitrate. As with anything related to your pond an education is key and the more you can learn the better off your koi will be.

Some of you may say "Hey Jerry you forgot Sodium Thiosulfate". I didn't forget it, you CAN use it as a dechlor but that's all it will do. It does not bind the ammonia, nitrite or the nitrate.

There is discussion that one shouldn't need a binder because their filter system should handle it all. But we all do not have the perfect set up from shape of pond, filtration and number of fish, so we all can use a little help.

Ohh and on the subjects of water changes be sure to test your source water before you do a change.


Matt attended his first Koi Club of San Diego meeting in 2003 at the home of Norm Meck and immediately caught the koi bug. Since then he has been extremely active in the club by serving as Club President, Vice President of both Program and Venue and now holds the record as a fourth time Koi Show Chairman! Matt was also Koi Person of the Year in 2010! Growing up in Mission Beach, when he wasn't rescuing people from the surf as a lifeguard (who was often mistaken for "The Hoff") he spent lots of time in the water surfing, standup paddle boarding and now competes in open ocean canoe racing. Matt started out on his fish venture with a 15 gallon aquarium, a few early koi pond attempts and as you can see from Bill Newell's beautiful photographs he now has a beautiful and high tech Dream Pond!

The 16,000 gallon, 8' deep concrete dream pond was designed and built by Steve "Buck" Buckles with help from Matt and a few sub-contractors. The pond is equipped with the latest technology that includes a Profi Rotary Drum Eco 6560 mechanical filter, 8 large Bakki showers loaded with ceramic media serving as the biological filter, two ¾ hp Artesian pumps, an Aqua Viper 400 watt UV, large air pump, automatic feeder and the list goes on!

The pond is home to around 25 gorgeous fish who have patiently waited for three years in a plastic swimming pool while building permits were processed and the pond was being finished. Funny... fish don't really understand all the permitting process stuff. The majority of the fish are from our good friends Ken Liu of Barstow Koi and Ben Plonski of Laguna Koi. Matt's favorite variety is Shiro Utsuri and some are from Omosako Koi Farm in Japan. Matt loves showing his fish and has showed and won lots of awards in San Diego as well as Gardena, Bakersfield and Fresno. In closing, Matt has one of the best Senses of Humor and always keeps us smiling. "If you're not having fun, you're not doing it right."

A big thanks to Matt Rhoades who went into the pit (again) to pull out eight heavy, dirty rectangles of open cell foam for cleaning.





Koi Pond Questions and Answers

What does ppm actually mean?? We often hear the measurement of ppm or Parts Per Million when discussing water quality issues but what does ppm actually mean? How does it relate to our ponds?? Here's everything you may or may not want to know about this necessary math lesson that doctors, scientists, astronauts and even savvy pond keepers use.

Most contaminants are expressed as parts per million (ppm). This mean that the concentration of a particular substance is very low even though the regulatory agency may consider it a significant amount. One ppm is 1 part in 1 million or the value is equivalent to the absolute fractional amount multiplied by one million. Confused? A better way to think of ppm is to visualize putting four drops of ink in a 55-gallon barrel of water and mixing it thoroughly. This procedure would produce an ink concentration of 1 ppm. Would it be safe to drink? Well, that depends on what the ink is made of and what was in the barrel before the water.

Parts per million also can be expressed as milligrams per liter (mg/L). This measurement is the mass of a chemical or contaminate per unit volume of water. Seeing ppm or mg/L on a lab report means the same thing! It is 1 mg of mass in a 1 liter container. To visualize this, One ppm is like:

One inch in 16 miles One second in 11.5 days One minute in two years

The Metric System units go in steps of 10, 100, and 1,000. For example, a milligram is a thousandth of a gram (moving the decimal point three places to the left) and a gram is a thousandth of a kilogram (again a difference of three places to the left on the decimal point). Thus, a milligram is a thousandth of a thousandth, or a millionth of a kilogram moving the decimal point six places. So, a milligram is one ppm of a kilogram; therefore, one ppm is the same as one milligram per kilogram.

One milligram in a kg is 1 ppm (by mass). One liter (L) of pure water (at 4 deg C and 1 standard atmosphere pressure) weighs exactly 1 kg, so 1 mg/L is 1ppm. Another way to say it is a liter of water weighs 1,000 grams or 1 million milligrams or 1 part per million. So is this important to us?

As an example, most of you may know that Ammonia (at any level) is very harmful to our pond dwellers and that is why we test for it religiously. If you notice your test kit's Ammonia first reading is .25 ppm (which would be like 1 drop of ink in that 55 gallon barrel) Yes... our fish are that sensitive so it's important that you know this stuff if you want to take this hobby seriously.

Final Real World Example: You may have heard or read that dosing your pond with 2-3 ppm Potassium Permanganate (aka PP) is a great way to dissolve organic compounds but if you don't do the math correctly and overdose your pond to 6 ppm you may harm or even kill your fish. So based on what you have read above, how do you determine what 2-3 ppm of what your pond is? First off you must know the total volume of your pond including filters, plant bogs, pipes, etc to be totally accurate. Let's say you have determined that you have a 5,000 gallon pond which equates to 18,927 liters. (ask Siri she knows). So here's the simple math for a 18,927 liter pond:

1 ppm/L = 18,927 mg/L (remember you need one mg/L so you need 18,927 mg of PP)

1000 mg = 1 gram so divide your 18,927 mg by a thousand and you get 18.927 grams/L to obtain 1ppm and double that to get 37.85 grams or 2ppm and so on.

You would be safe adding 38 grams of PP to a 5,000 pond to reach 2 ppm.

Hint: Don't have a gram scale? PP weighs 6 grams per tsp so you can figure 6.33 teaspoons to achieve 2 ppm in a 5,000 gallon pond. Keep Koiing!!

Ten Commandments of Koi Keeping

- #1- Be skeptical of Marketing Representative. Ask them the "downside" of whatever they are recommending and see what they can say.
- #2- It will always be your favorite fish that dies. Try never to name your fish.
- #3- The best Koi are always being held for someone else.
- #4- Avoid Corn in the top two ingredients of any Koi diet. Fish meal or Shrimp meal should be first.
- #5- Always test first, then you can treat later.
- #6- Only buy imported Koi after the retailer's 3-week quarantine.
- #7- Assume that all new fish are infected with something.
- #8- You can make your own filter, but buy a no-cut bottom drain.
- #9- Avoid crowding fish, but if you must, you will need to be a master of water quality.
- #10-Always be ready to make major water-changes.



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

I had included the Roark article on PP TX but was informed it was outdated and newer information exist that is more precise. Therefore I have added the link to the Roark method in case anyone wants to see what he was doing. I would recommend that if you have never used Potassium Permanganate that you do a bit of research first as it can kill all your koi if not used properly. On the other hand it can be pretty useful if used correctly.

We are all adults and quite capable of making our own decisions, AFTER doing some research and understanding the issues.

I am leaving the links in as a source of information only.

At the rescue sanctuary I use PP as needed and have never had an issue with it. Most of the times I use it between fish loads to NUKE a filter and pond for the next load of fish. I even used it on my swimming pool
